

What is the BAECP-Former Worker Medical Screening Program (FWP)?

The FWP provides free medical screenings to all former employees of the Line 1/Division B/Burlington Atomic Energy Commission Plant (BAECP) at the Iowa Army Ammunition Plant (IAAP) from 1949-1975 who may be at-risk for health conditions as a result of exposure to hazardous or radioactive substances during their employment. Workers may have been exposed to:

AGENTS/EXPOSURES

- Asbestos
- Radiation
- Beryllium
- Solvents
- MOCA
- High Explosives
- Adhesives
- Depleted Uranium

The BAECP-Former Worker Program (FWP) is conducted by The University of Iowa College of Public Health and funded by the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE).

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Who is eligible for the screenings?

All individuals who worked for or in the vicinity of Line 1/Division B are eligible for the free medical screening, no matter how long or short the employment period or current health status.

Those eligible include:

- those directly involved with AEC/DOE production operations
- guards on surveillance duty
- laundry personnel who handled contaminated clothing
- cafeteria staff
- various tradespersons
- delivery and storage personnel
- contractors, sub-contractors, IAAP employees who were involved in ongoing construction and maintenance activities
- those who worked in the rail and storage yards, burning fields and demolition areas, including Yards C, G, and L; Firing Site Areas, Burning Field "B" and Storage Sites for Pits and Weapons, and Buildings 73 and 77

How do eligible former workers take part in the FWP?

All former Line 1/Division B workers are invited to take part in the medical screenings.

Where are the medical screenings offered?

For those living in Iowa, medical screenings are provided by our staff and collaborating medical centers at at Great River Medical Center in Burlington, Henry County Health Center in Mount Pleasant, University of Iowa in Iowa City, and the McFarland Clinic in Ames.

We do home visits for homebound workers and can arrange for screenings at other locations in Iowa and throughout the country through DOE's National Supplemental Screening Program (NSSP).

What is included in the free medical screenings?

The screenings last one to two hours and includes:

MEDICAL SCREENING TESTS

- Review of work and medical history
- Chest X-ray
- Pulmonary Function Test (PFT)/Spirometry
- Blood tests, including Beryllium Lymphocyte Proliferation Test (BeLPT)

How will the screening benefit former workers?

The purpose of the medical screening is to detect work-related illness(es) as early as possible. Early detection can and does save lives.

The program has several benefits including the chance to:

- be checked by doctors trained in illnesses caused by work
- find out more about your health
- ask questions about past exposures on Line 1/Division B
- learn what steps can be taken if a health condition is found

Is there a cost for participating in this program?

No, there is no cost for program enrollment or the medical screening tests. The free screening is provided to you by the DOE. Participation in this program is voluntary.

Who will get the results of the medical screening? How private are these results?

Former workers will get their results in the mail within two weeks to three months after their exam. If there are any abnormal results, we will provide recommendations for follow-up medical care, which may include additional tests or exams. Your personal doctor may do the follow-up evaluation or we can help you find a doctor.

The FWP does not pay for follow-up medical care and testing.

Your participation in this program will be considered confidential to the extent permitted by law. Your questionnaire responses will be used only by the BAACP-FWP staff for health risk assessment purposes. If any medical screening results are published, no information that could personally identify any individuals will be included.

What about secrecy or classified information?

No one will be asked to give any classified information. Former workers should not answer any questions that they are concerned about.

How does the BAACP-FWP relate to the Department of Labor compensation program, EEOICPA?

A separate program, the Energy Employees Occupational Illness Compensation Program Act (EEOICPA) is a federal law that provides compensation to former workers who were potentially exposed to hazardous materials as a result of their work for DOE. The EEOICP is currently administered by the Department of Labor (DOL).

If the former worker's medical history and/or BAACP-FWP screening results suggest an occupational illness, then they may be used to support a claim for compensation for toxin- or radiation-induced occupational illnesses that may have resulted from work for the DOE, including sensitization to beryllium, chronic beryllium disease, asbestosis, pulmonary fibrosis, and radiogenic cancers.

Compensation includes a lump sum payment of \$150,000 and medical expenses related to accepted occupational illness and may be available to eligible workers or their surviving spouses or dependent children.

The BAACP-FWP medical screening is an independent and separate program from state and federal compensation programs, including the EEOICP.

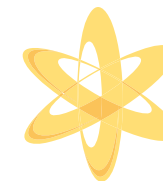
Filing a claim with the DOL is a separate process from completing the BAACP-FWP Health and Work History Questionnaire.

The BAACP-FWP can provide claims forms and guidance on how to fill them out. Once the claim is filed, the BAACP-FWP has no further involvement with the claims process.
